

I came here from Chengdu, which is the capital of the Chinese province of Sichuan. I live there with my mom, dad, sister, and younger brother. After accomplishing nine years of school there, I searched the internet for a secondary education school in the United States, and I found GSAA, and in September of 2018 I arrived at Idaho.

Being out of my country for the first time, having a different language to speak and culture to adjust to wasn't very easy. I had to learn lots of new things. My GSAA family (students and staff) was always there for me and was very friendly and helpful in making my learning here much more accessible.

I like the educational program that Gem State provides for students, where I can express my thoughts on subjects and have friends all day around me. Although, after graduation, I want to pursue a career in medicine, I want to become a doctor. I like the challenge.

I miss my country very much, but, unfortunately, I haven't had a chance to go back due to COVID-19. I hope the situation will get better and I can travel back home to see my family soon. But for now, I have my GSAA family and the host family who helps and supports me.



hat does it take to be a good mom or dad? How do you take care of an infant baby? And what are the baby needs? Why does the baby cry so much? Why is he awake in the night and sleepy in the daytime? And, finally, how much time will I have left for myself? All of these questions and many others were going through the minds of the students of the A&P class when they, for the first time, took home for 24 hours a cute little RealCare robotic baby.

"The robotic baby project is a part of the human body study at the GSAA Anatomy and Physiology class. The infant simulator is a unique learning aid that imitates the behavior of a real baby. It helps students to experience real baby care and to learn more about responsibility, parenting demands of a baby, and how it affects them as a teenage parent ", explains Glen Wahlman, GSAA Science teacher. Here are the students' feedbacks about their robotic baby experience.

#### Sela

I was looking forward to doing the baby project. It was interesting to feel myself in the shoes of a parent of an infant. This experience was challenging and rewarding. It shocked me how much time of my day it took! It was a lot of responsibility to take care of the baby. The most challenging part about this project was carrying the baby around the school and taking care of it during class. People around me were curious, kind, and supportive, but it was challenging to listen and participate in class while helping the baby stop crying. In public, I got stares because, at first glance, I looked like a teen mom with a real baby. People had questions. And when I brought my robotic baby home, my family was shocked, but later they were cool about it. I had to spend the night taking care of this baby. I couldn't imagine how little time I would have for sleep. But I survived.

Even though it was for a day, it was an eye-opening experience of commitment and responsibility of becoming a parent, even if it was just for a day.

#### Destiny

I found this project to be very rewarding because it shined light onto the reality of a baby. I had to go out of my way to do things for the baby I would do, such as making sure my car wasn't too hot. I also learned how a baby is very demanding and follows their schedule. It seemed as if the baby would cry at the worst times or

that it cried often. It was also challenging to take care of the baby during the night because I wouldn't say I like to wake up many times.

I found the Real Life Baby Project to be very educational. Because of this, I would recommend that any student planning on possibly having kids in their future take part in the project because it shows you the reality of a baby. I believe this project opens up an opportunity for people to see what taking care of a baby can mean and how it can affect every aspect of your life, from going out in public, finding time for the baby, and even simply getting sleep.




- The GSAA Art program received 10 display easels for the art show.
