Introducing: STEM Class

Gem State Academy is blessed this year to be able to offer a new class called STEM - which stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. Right now it is only offered to juniors and seniors, but ideally, it'll open up with a basics for underclassmen and an Advanced class for the uppers. Instead of trying to explain ourselves what goes on in this elective class, we thought

we'd ask the students and the teacher himself.

From Mr. Waterhouse, the teacher and founder of the class:

Why does Gem State need this class?

In our ever-changing world, I think it is important that our students not only excel academically, but they excel in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. Along with this, I believe a kinesthetic approach is necessary. Many of our children have no idea how to use their hands anymore. It is important that we teach our students how to Analyze a need or problem, Design a solution, Create and Build your design, and then Evaluate your Design against the requirements and needs. I believe these skills are lacking in today's environment. And I believe these skills will become more and more necessary.

What are the students learning?

Our class is split up by quarters. Semester 1 is split up into two sections; Robotics, and basic computer programming and electronics via Arduino controllers. Semester 2 is still dependent on how much money we can raise. The options are as follows; 3D programming and designing, 3D printing, into to materials and construction, and design and construction of Bass and Electric Guitars.

What do you see as the future STEM?

I see this class being taught in different sections covering different topics. Ultimately, I'd like the

advanced STEM class to design, build, test, market, and sell Bass and Electric Guitars. I would also like to give them the opportunity to make one for themselves to use in the Worship Leadership Class.

And then we talked with some of the students:

STEM class is an elective class; Why did you choose to take it?

I chose this class because I wanted a break from other extra curricular classes. And when I heard what we were going to be doing, I was so excited! I am doing things that I am actually in to! Michael Maricio, class of 2022

I am hoping to increase my fine motor skills through building things such as robots

The hands-on application to school and learning really helps me and is really fun. The class is full of all guys who love physics, so the class is pretty enjoyable. We all have a knack for working with our hands and learning new ways of doing things. *Mason Russell, class of 2022*

How do you think this class will help you with your future education/career?

The basis of this class is giving me a new mindset in life; A mindset that is more creative and open to learning and creating new things. With all the variety of ideas and technology that we go over and learn about in STEM class it will really help me in narrowing down on and finding what specific type of STEM I want to focus my education, career, life, and future on.
