Students Learn About Serving Others at Boise AMEN Clinic

"Coming together as a school and helping out made me realize the impact we could have on our community."

Students and staff volunteered all three days during the Boise AMEN Clinic at Expo Idaho September 12-14, 2018. The clinic provided medical, dental, vision and other services to over 1,400 patients. Hundreds of volunteers helped provide services, including some of GSAA's own alumni Dr. Victor Cook '66 and Dr. Todd Spainhower '82.

The GSAA staff and students assembled and distributed food boxes from the Idaho Food Bank, escorted patients to the different medical stations, provided child care, translated for non-English speaking patients, and helped register people. In addition, the GSAA handbell choir performed for patients waiting outside to get into the clinic.

Many students were surprised by how patiently people waited outside to be seen. "The long hours these people waited outside showed how badly they needed help. It makes you realize how privileged we are to have insurance and get medical care," notes junior Kevin Recuenco.

"Idon'tknowhowsome of these people keep smiles



on their faces after hearing about their pain and suffering," says junior Jenae Rogers. "I talked to a person with a brain tumor, someone who was going blind, and another person who had been kicked in the mouth."

Another junior, Grace Thomsen, summed it up well, "One of the most important things in life is helping others and making a difference. I loved participating in the AMEN Clinic because it not only made a difference in the lives

of these patients, but in my life as well."

The Boise AMEN Clinic was put on by the Adventist Medical Evangelism Network, which provides clinics for the uninsured and underinsured in communities around the United States. The clinic was sponsored by former faculty Fred Cornforth. These clinics wouldn't be possible without the help of countless volunteers and medical professionals. #

GSAA Receives \$10,000 STEM Grant for Robotics Program

Gem State Adventist Academy has received a \$10,000 grant from Versacare Inc. to incorporate a robotics program into its curriculum. Math and physics teacher, Mark Waterhouse, says he hopes this will get students excited about science, technology, engineering, and math, and provide more concrete learning opportunities for STEM topics. The grant money will be used to purchase the needed equipment and software for the new robotics program.

The robotics program will also allow GSAA students to mentor elementary

students at area Adventist schools by having a junior robotics program at GSAA for grades 7 and 8. The program will be divided into junior robotics (grades 7-9) and senior robotics (grades 10-12). Students will also be able to compete with the creations they engineer.

New Scholarship to Honor Former Teacher Ray Blue

A new scholarship has been created by Community Development Inc. (CDI) in honor of former faculty member Ray Blue, who taught math and physics at GSAA for 22 years where he impacted the lives of hundreds of students. The Ray

Blue Scholarship will be given out to GSAA students each year who exhibit excellence in math.

From an early age, it was clear Ray excelled in math and science. He attended Union College in Lincoln to study engineering but ended up getting a degree in Education.

Ray accepted a position as a math teacher at Plainview Academy in South Dakota. There, he continued his education attending The University of South Dakota and graduating with a master's degree in physics. Ray worked at other Adventist academies in Minnesota and California before accepting a

position at Gem State Adventist Academy in 1970.

In 1992, Ray retired from teaching to begin the second phase of his career as a builder and land developer with CDI. This afforded him the opportunity, in his spare time,

> to travel the world with his wife Betty, vacationing and building orphanages, churches and schools. The couple traveled to over 20 countries together. Sadly, Ray passed away on January 30, 2018 at the age of 82.

State of the School

A report from GSAA Principal Marvin Thorman



I am often asked how Gem State is doing, and I am proud to say GSAA is thriving. We have made huge strides in financial stability in the past four years. It has truly been a walk in faith, but God is so good. He knows our young people need this school. Here are just a few of the ways GSAA is more financially stable than it was five years ago:

- Four consecutive years of operating in the black
- \$400,000 ahead with cash on hand
- \$300,000 reduced debt to Idaho Conference
- \$200,000 funded capital improvements
- Student debt ratio has dropped by almost 200%
- Philanthropic giving to GSAA has more than doubled
- The average student now receives 35% in tuition assistance

And we have done all of this without raising tuition during the past five years! What a miracle!

We remain dedicated providing the best faith-based education possible. A recent survey from Walla Walla University shows our students perform well against other North Pacific Union Conference academy graduates, grabbing the top spot in math among freshman and sophomore college students.

A recent survey of our alumni revealed that 85% of Gem State students go on to college (the national average among highschool graduates is 66%). The same survey also showed that 30% of our graduates go on to receive a master or doctorate degree. In addition, the survey showed that a significant portion of our alumni go into the fields of healthcare and education, which resonates with our core mission statement: "Training for Leadership. Engaging in Service. Preparing for Eternity."

Challenges remain of course, and there are many opportunities for growth, including the need to update infrastructure and campus beautification, more recruiting to grow enrollment, and keeping tuition affordable for families. I am excited to report though that the GSAA Operating Board recently voted to hire a half-time marketing and recruiting staff person to help address the challenge of growing enrollment at GSAA.



Part of that process was to collect information from key stakeholders, such as students, parents, alumni, pastors, the board, faculty and constituents. A consultant was asked to facilitate the process, which included:

- Review of the mission, vision, and values statements
- Identifying and understanding key stakeholders
- Understanding and prioritizing the schools strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT)
- Formal surveys of students, parents, constituents and alumni
- Combining all this information and developing a five-year plan

Many of you have been a part of this process in some way. Your input has been invaluable as the board, administration, and faculty plan for the future. We can't thank you enough. It is evident you love this school just as much as we


